Great inspiration has come from the reading of books and people have treasured books. Someone has said, "Never lend books, no one ever returns them. The only books I have in my library are those people wh have lent me! is a saying by Anatole Francis.

Of course, weknow that at the center of our library will be the Book of Books. We speak of the Bible as the Word of God and this is true. Jesus Himself is the Living Word of truth which the Heavenly Father sent into the world that men might discover in the through Him what the heart and mind and soul of God was like. John the Beloved begins his gospel story about Jesus with these significant words, In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God and the Word was God, the same was in the beginning with God. All things were made by Him and without Him was not anything made that was made. In Him was life, and the life was the Light of men. John 1:1-4.

It is evident that the Word in this instance is being used as a symbol of intelligence. Johnisby has symbolic use of language brying to tell us that whatsoever of intelligence there is in the world much more of intelligence of man's with His finite mind has yet been able to discover understand and appropriate was in the beginning with the Heavenly Father and that everything that we see in this order of the world about us that gives evidence to thought enlightenment was made by the Word, the creative intellagence of God.

They were put on board the Missiouri River steamer whose captain took the first fire canoe that ever made the Long journey of 2200 miles to the mouth of the Yellowstone River. Ta-wis-sis-fim-mim who made this horrible speech at the banquet, died near the mouth of the Yellowstone River, so that only one of the four was left to

On the shelf in our library will be a Bible that has been translated in some part and in some languages beyond 1000 dialects. This book is being published, translated, and distributed through many sources of the American Bible Society employs a force beyond 3690 persons to carry on a world-wide ministry of getting the book out to the peopel.

There is a story that was published years ago which told of an Indiana who lived in a section of the Great Northwest who heard about the white man's back of Heaven. They said it was the source of the white man's power. Traders had told them that some day missionaries would come from the country toward the rising sun with the white man's Bible and tell them all about the wonderful God. And so for years they waited for and watched.

Finally a tribal council was called and after much deliberation it was dedided to send five of their braves, three old men and two young ones on a long journey into the great unknown beyond the Rocky Mountains in search of a white man's Book of Heaven.

One spring morning the five braves who had been chosen turned to the face of eastward but after two days of hard travel, one of the old men turned back saying, he was too old to endure the hardships on the way. The others traveled for months, 2000 miles acrose mountains, hills, plains, until they

reaced St. Louis, Mo. then but a small fontier post where a few hundred settlers made their homes. Early one October morning in 1882 these travel-worn Indians saw in the distance the houses of this little settlement. It was the first fown that they had ever seen, but if they were surprised, they gave no sign. They pushed their silent way through the streets looking to neither the right or the left.

When Gen. Clark, who was then in command of the barracks heard that Ruxt four strange Undians were without, he sent two officers to bring them in thinking they had come to make a treaty of some sort. The Indicans entered the barracks and wakmin with calm and dignity and after greeting Gen. Clark, took their seats in silence. Days passed and still these strange messengers said nothing as to the purpose of this journey, but at last they told the meaning of it all. They wanted the white man's Book of Heaven. Would gen. Clark give it to them? They wanted to know God as the white man knew him. Would Gen Clark tell them? They wanted a teacher who would go with them to the land of the setting sun, there to break to their people the bread of life. Would Gen. Clark send one?

Gen. Clarak hardly knew what to say. He told them all that he tought that they could understand about the white man's God but he had no Bible printed in the language those Indicans used, and he was not in command of missionaries and so he could

not fully satisfy their strange request. All winter long the Indians waited and watched hoping to learn more than they had been told about the white man's God. During that time Gen. Calrk planned (amusements) for them, and did everything that he could to make their stay a pleasure. That winter the two old men were weakened by their long journey, the second one died and in the spring, the two who remained indicated that their desire to start on that long journey back to their people.

Gen. Clark heaped many rich gifts upon them in parting and on the night before their departure he gave them a great banguet in his own home. When the meal was over he asked Pa-wis-fif-fim-nim, No Horns on His Head, to assist the company and these are the words which that silent Indian spoke as translated by another Indian who was present at the banquet and who acted as an interpreter.

"I came to you over the trail of many moons from the land of the Setting Sun. You were the friends of my fathers who have gone the long way. I came to you with my eyes partly open from our people who sit in darkness, I go back with both eyes closed. How can I go back blind to my blind people? I made my way to you with strong arms, through many enemies, and stange lands and I carry back to them the white man's books of Heaven. Igo back with both arms broken and empty. The two pheasant who came with us were braves of many snows and wars

in short, this great sentence is far more than a proof text for inspiration, if it is carefully considered, balanced, and an authoratative statement of the Christian use of the Bible. There is the origin of the Divine Word briefly stated and it is profitable for doctrine, reproof, and correction. Here is the proof.

Mine to tell me whence I came, Mine to tell me what I am.

There is no question that is more important the that which has to do with the authority of this Books of Books. What we believe about God, about sin, about Jesus Christ, about the Christian church, the ultimate destiny of the human soul, all of these depend upon these book. Now on what do we base out confidence that the Bible is the Word of God. How do we know

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that the Bible is inspired . What is the gournd for this authority?

We believe in the inspiration of the scripture because of its perfect unity. This books is made up of 66 different parts, written over at least by 40 different authors over a period of 1500 years between the writing of the first and last book. We should naturally expect variances and discord but yet when we come to study we find that each fits into the other. There is unity of prophecy. There is unity of difinite purpose in mind.

There is a remarkable unity of the gospels. They are different and yet they are onem Matt. was written for the Jews, that Jeass was the long promised Messiah, Mark's gospel was for the Romans, here Jesus is the God of might, Luke wrote for the Greeks and revealed to us Jesus as the God of beauty and wisdom. John wrote of theworld and shows us Jesus the final expression of the Father.

We believe in the inspiration of the Bible because of the moral law which is therein contained to deny the inspirations of the Bible is the raise at once questions far harder to answer than those which come from a full and complete acceptance

But the greatest of all the foundations stones of our belief is that the power of the Bible is to change the hearts of

men and women. They will stand up today and state that the Bible has been the book that transformed their lives and instead of darkness there is light, instead of death there is life.

because it is inspired. The stories told about an Italian girl who frank was found by an unbeliever reading the Bible. He asked here why she read the Bible, and he inquired why she spent so much time readingthat book. "Because sir," she siad, "it is the Word of God". Consider the precision the Bible frequently makes statements which relate to science phenomena and which in this
day seem to be unbelievable. This fact is questioned by many
who have not thought out all the facts in the case. At this
point we think about the Research Science Bureau of Los Angelos
Calif.a group of 200 scientists represented a wide range of
scientists who offere d 10000 to anyboyd who could prove any
scientific statement of the Bible to be false. As yet no one
has earned that award.

Consider the pecularities of the Bible. They are unique.

There are many events discribed which are super-natural. God
has taken a pecular interest in the effairs of men and at times
in over-ruled the unusual action of the laws of nature, for
the children of Isreal, the River Jordan was divided and released, the plagues of Egypt which condemned Pharoahs'
oppression. We think about the miracles of Elisha and
Elija which indicates God's supervision of human history
in the N. T. We meet with the miralce of the Virgin Birth,
the Messiah and the ministry of Jesus feeding 5000. As we
look at such records they seem almost unbelievable.

Consider the prophecies of this Book. Over and over again we find declarations of Thus sayeth the Lord, definitely for-

telling the future events as related to persons and cities and nations. Man's wisdom has never been able to foretell the future of cities and nations but there are prophecies in both the Old and New Testaments which have not yet been fulfilled expecially those relating to the Kingdom and the reign of the Messiah of Isreal, and the resurrection of the just but in the life and death and resurrection of Jesus we find over 100 distinc items of prophecy literally fulfilled.

Consider te power as we look into another realm. No other literature has influenced man as this Bible. Shake-speare was profoundly interextential influenced by the Bible and quoted from the pages hundreds of times in his writings. Blessings have resulted from the Bible being opened in the homes in cities, and in nations.

Consider the preiminence of this book. Supernatural in its composition, it has mever failed to make good its claims of the written Word of God. It reveals facts and policies which are entirely apart from man's knowledge and reason. It finds men's hearts and speaks to their condition, the dying sinner often regrets his neglect of the message. The dying saint takes confort in its promises.

The Book has a message of good news. It is like a pocket radio all wired up with a transmitter, the Word of God as faith turns of the power of God's Holy Spirit we hear God
