

GRAVESITE VIGIL

STATEWIDE COMMEMORATIONS 21 FEBRUARY 2016

"... at the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them."



At 35 cemeteries across the state, Vietnam veterans, next of kin, families and friends gathered to honour the 98 Vietnam veterans who died during the Vietnam War and are buried or commemorated in Victorian cemeteries.

At 12 noon, simultaneous commemorative services, identical in every respect, were conducted by Victorian Vietnam veterans, bugle calls resounded and national flags and hand-made poppies were placed in remembrance.

It is the first time that commemorations on such a scale have ever been conducted in Victoria.

From Seymour to Canberra, Victorian Vietnam veterans, descendants, wives and friends joined a group of Queenslanders – who rode from Toowoomba – in the national capital. The "Service and Sacrifice" tour paid tribute to the 521 Australians who gave their lives during the Vietnam War while the riding tops, adorned with stylized medal ribbons from the Boer War to the present, acknowledged Australia's wartime history.

The tour visited significant memorials, cemeteries and military establishments along the way. On the final day, the tour was joined by young ADF and ADFA riders for a ceremonial ride through Canberra. Stopping at the Australian Vietnam Forces National Memorial for a commemorative service, the riders then continued up ANZAC Avenue to Old Parliament House where a lunch in the Members Dining Room brought the tour to an end.

The Premier of Victoria, the Hon. Daniel Andrews MP joined 500 guests for the civic reception. The Premier welcomed guests, spoke on the significance of the Vietnam War and presented certificates to Victorian student winners of the Vietnam War history competition. The first public performance of "Echoes of Conflict" composed by Vietnam veteran Lachlan Wilson, and a performance by the cast of stage production "Rolling Thunder" provided the musical highlights of the evening.

















In the presence of Her Excellency Linda Dessau AC, Governor of Victoria and Mr Anthony Howard Qc, the Hon, Daniel Andrews MP, Premier of Victoria and Mrs. Catherine Andrews, the Hon John Eren MP. Victorian Minister for Veterans and distinguished guests, the largest contingent of Vietnam veterans seen for many years commemorated Vietnam Veterans Day 2016 at the Melbourne Shrine of Remembrance. In excess of 2200 Victorian schoolchildren and a huge spectator group watched the march to the Shrine and a re-enactment of the placing of the Long Tan Cross in Vietnam in 1969. White crosses, each bearing the name of an Australian service member who died during the Vietnam War, and each with a hand-made poppy and flag affixed, took pride of place on the Shrine forecourt lawn.


